## 1. To graduate you must: p. 5

- 1) Be enrolled in college for 4 or more years
  - \* The number of years may change for Accelerated Program students and transfer students
    - \* Students who fail to graduate by the end of 4th year move onto 5th year, 6th year; however, no students may stay more than 8 years.

2) Complete required credits for graduation Total: 124 credits or more

Complete the required credits in the correct subject fields based on your curriculum

**Credit** Language Subject "Elementary English A"=4 credits (60 classes + preparation and review) Lecture Subject "Introduction to Psychology" =2 credits (15 classes + preparation and review)

- Students must complete and receive credit for 'Intermediate English A/B' in order to take subjects held in English. Students must complete and receive credit for 'Pre-Intermediate English A/B' in order to take `Bridge Program'\* subjects.

\*The "Bridge Program" courses offer students a way to study a wide variety of Liberal Arts subjects while improving their English ability. These courses were established as a first step for students who have completed 'Pre-intermediate English A/B' and are ready to begin taking classes held in English.

# 5. Registering Courses for your 1<sup>st</sup> semester

#### Maximum Credit Limit: 18 Credits

You may register as many credits as you like up to the maximum credit limit. There is no lower limit to the number of credits you may register, but you will need to be aware of the graduation requirements that must be met during your 4 years as well as any scholarship requirements you may have. The University recommends that 1st year students register up to the maximum credit limit.

If you have an 'E (=Exemption)' grade in your grade report, the university will register the next level of the language subject for you.

### 2) 1st Year Education Subjects

(A) '1st -Year Student Workshop I·II'

2014 fall enrollees will be automatically enrolled in the '1st-Year Student Workshop I·II' held in the same language as your language of enrollment in their 1st semester. Regardless of whether you pass or fail each course, they may only be taken once. '1<sup>st</sup>-Year Student Workshop I' (2 credits) covers all the basics for studying at university: literature surveys, how to write reports, how to cite resources etc.

'1<sup>st</sup> -Year Student Workshop II' (2 credits) uses multicultural group work to gain the knowledge and skills that will be the basis of a course project.

(B) 'Introduction to APU' \*Registration is voluntary (If you wish to take this course, please register it yourself)

This subject is only available to 1<sup>st</sup>-year students. You may only register for a class held in the same language as your language of enrollment. This course presents students with the ideals and history of APU, and aims to support students in everyday university life while developing their identities as APU students. Objectives include increasing student motivation towards education and personal goals, developing of subjective and active learning styles, and creation of a learning community.

#### 3) APM Compulsory Registration Subjects

\*Only for APM students

(A) 'Introduction to Management'

In your 1st semester, the University will register for a class held in the same language as your language of enrollment.

(B) 'Business Mathematics'

In your 2nd semester, the University will register for a class held in the same language as your language of enrollment. Students will begin from one of the following three levels according to the results of the mathematics placement test at the time of enrollment. The University will inform students by Campus Terminal which level they have qualified for during their 1st semester, before Course Registration Period B.

- 1. The registration of 'Fundamental Mathematics' is strongly recommended during the 1st semester. The completion of 'Fundamental Mathematics' is not a requirement but will be helpful in improving math skills before taking 'Business Mathematics'.
- 2. The University will register "Business Mathematics" for the 2nd semester.
- 3. Registration for "Business Mathematics" is unnecessary. Regardless of whether or not students wish to be exempted, they cannot register for "Business Mathematics."

## Schedule & Classroom for Course Registration

Course Registration can be accessed by students via Campusmate online. You may conduct course
registration off campus, however as accessing the network using off campus computers may be slow, the
University recommends carrying out registration at APU (excluding AP House). You may register as many
credits as you like, up to the maximum credit limit. There is no lower limit to the number of credits you may
register, however, please be aware of the graduation criteria that must be met.

#### \*Campusmate cannot be used during the hours of 3:00am and 5:00am every day (Japan time)

- Only classes that you are eligible to register for will appear on your registration screen.
- Once a class has reached capacity, you may no longer register for it.

## 6. Class Attendance pp. 9-12

Please be sure to attend the classes that you have registered for. In the case a student misses classes due to an Infectious Disease recognized by the Japanese School Health and Safety Act, these missed classes will be treated as a recognized absence.

## Language Subjects, 1st Year Education Subjects (1<sup>st</sup>-Year Workshop I &II / Introduction to APU)

You will be required to attend at least 3/4 of the classes (including regular class days and final exam). If you do not attend this number of classes, you will automatically receive a failing (F) grade for the courses. And if you are not present at the time class attendance is taken, you will not be counted present. However, absences may be excused if you have contracted an infectious disease or have been granted a University-authorized leave of absence (see Undergraduate Academic Handbook for details).

## Lecture Subjects

Please inform your instructors if you need to be absent from class due to unavoidable reasons such as illness or bereavement. Your instructor will decide how to handle your absence. If you need to be absent for over a week due to unavoidable reasons such as illness, please come to the Academic Office.
