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Common Liberal Arts Subject
Due to the nature of the externship, students must have strong motivation and desire to complete all aspects of this course. It is required that students are currently enrolled in or have completed Intermediate English at the time of application (2025AY Fall Semester). Students who are currently enrolled in Intermediate English are required to successfully complete the course by 2025AY Fall Semester.
Internship practicum (E), an integral component of "the Internship (E)" and has two main objectives. First, it is intended to provide students an opportunity to apply the language skills he/she would have acquired during the language component of this Service-Learning program. Second, it aims to provide students an early exposure to a work environment, which may help in choosing a field of study or a career path. Strictly speaking, although the name of the course is entitled Internship, the work experiences the students will gain through this course is referred to as an externship. An externship differs from an internship in that it is typically undertaken during the early stages of a student's education, and it is ideal for students who may still be deciding on their career paths. An externship is typically more supervised and given less skilled activities than an internship, but it allows a student to learn various facets of an organization's business. Being an extern, he/she will shadow an employee at an organization and will get some hands-on experience; however, an extern may end up doing more than mere shadowing depending on the student's willingness and capacity (language skills, communication skills, etc.). To make the best of an externship, students will aim for their personal growth and develop specific skills they choose based on the APU Rubric.
By completing this course, the students are expected to • become aware of the demands and responsibilities of working in society • acquire professional manners and skills • broaden their perspectives and develop intercultural communication skills to work "globally" • create a clear career vision
The pre-departure and post-externship classes will include general lectures, group discussions, assignments, quizzes, and student presentations. Students must come prepared to participate in all class activities. Additionally, students may be instructed to attend individual consultations with the instructor and/or program staff to ensure study progress.

Overview of Each Class	The course Internship (E) is composed of pre-departure classes in 2026AY Spring Semester (4 lectures or more; tentative), the externship in both 2026AY Spring Semester – Summer Session and Fall Semester 1st Quarter, and post-externship classes in 2026AY Fall Semester 2nd Quarter (4 lectures or more; tentative).
	Classes will be held once a month from April to July, for a total of four sessions. Scheduled for Wednesday, 5th period. Final dates will be announced on Moodle. Session Topics: • Traits, skills, and characteristics required for successful professionals • Identifying personal strengths and learning how to showcase them • Professional resumes and essentials for a successful cross-cultural externship • The significance of reflection and how to write a weekly reflective journal
	A one-on-one consultation and feedback session will be held before departure. Students are expected to complete and submit assignments related to their career vision and path.
	The externship in the U.S. The students will gain 90+ hours of invaluable work experience in various fields, ranging from education to hospitality. The students are expected to submit a weekly on-line reflective journal to reflect on their experience academically, professionally, and personally.
	Post-externship classes (at APU) Will be held from December to January, for a total of four times. Scheduled for Wednesday 5th period. Dates will be announced on Moodle once finalized. Based on the experiences in the US, the students will 1.identify and reflect turning points that have brought changes in their perspectives or career vision 2.reflect social skills they newly acquired or realized important 3.develop a career vision and identify essential elements to choose their career path 4.make final presentations.
Practice Schedule	2026/8/21 - 2026/11/21
Study Content and Load outside of Class (preparation and review)	During the pre-departure classes, students are required to complete assignments such as conducting interviews, writing a resume, or reflecting their own learning in and out of the class. During the externship, in addition to class assignments, they need to submit a weekly reflective journal and comment each other's journals. After the externship, they will give presenation about their work experience, learning, and improvement in English.
Method of Grade Evaluation	Class participation (pre-departure & post-externship): 15% Class assignments (pre-departure): 10% Individual assignments Group assignments, etc. Externship report from UT Austin: 20% Weekly reflective journals and comments: 30% Final presentation: 10% Final reports: 15% Reflections of the goals, competencies, internship, personal growth, etc. * Minimum of 90 hours for Internship is required. * Four credits (P/F grade) will be given in the 2025AY Fall semester.
Method of Implementing Multicultural Collaborative Learning	Since this student body will learn together before, during, and after the externship, they are expected to actively get involved in a group discussion, exchange their ideas, encourage each other to attain individual goals, and establish a collaborative learning community. Team based learning is much more powerful than learning alone. Students are required to work collaboratively to improve their communication skills, survive difficult situations, and manage conflicts constrcutively.

Instructor's professional experience/involvement (outside academia)	Intercultural communication trainer (2001~2002)
Requirements for Students	Students are expected to submit all necessary assignments, deliver presentations, and attend all pre-departure and post-externship classes (see "Method of Grade Evaluation"). During the externship, the students must follow all the instructions given by the instructors at The University of Texas at Austin (UT Austin).

	The objectives of this course are as follows:
	1) Strengthen practical English skills in order to live and study in an English-speaking culture;
	2) Develop an understanding of the local culture and society;
Course Objectives	3) Develop an interest in and awareness of the English and academic skills that are needed for
	further study abroad (e.g., student exchange);
	4) Raise awareness of multiculturalism.
Teaching Methods	At APU, a variety of teaching methods will be used, including:
	 Teacher-directed and student-directed pair and group work in preparation for study abroad;
	Teacher-directed video and writing assignments;
	 Student-teacher advising sessions.
	At UT, a variety of teaching methods will be used in this course, including:
	· Teacher-directed and student-directed pair and group work as part of the English language
	program at UT.

Overview of Each Class	Overseas component: Class objectives and contents will be designated by the English Language Center at UT. Generally, students are required to complete a 13-week English communication course (including Listening, Speaking, Writing, Grammar etc.) for a total of approx. 170 instructional hours to receive credit for this course.
	APU component: (a) Four pre-departure English sessions (4 koma) 1. Learn formal and informal ways of speaking and writing in various settings 2. Make a self-promotion video 3. Practice making small talk for social situations and the workplace 4. Prepare to communicate in a multicultural workplace by understanding cultural differences and stereotypes *Students will work on assignments during the spring break in February and March 2025 (instructions will be given after the course is approved) (b) In-person consultation(s); Consultation(s) will be conducted prior to departure (c) Remote consultation(s); Remote consultation(s) will be conducted during the stay in Austin (d) Reflection class (1 koma) 1. Reflect on and share English learning experiences through the contexts of English classes, internship, extra-curricular activities, and daily life in Austin
Practice Schedule	Pre-departure Classes (at APU) Will be held once a month from April to July, for a total of four times. Scheduled for Wednesday 5th period. Dates and times will be announced on Moodle as soon as it is determined.
	Post-program class (at APU) Will be held either in December or January, one time. Scheduled for Wednesday 5th period. Date and time will be announced on Moodle as soon as it is determined.
Study Content and Load outside of Class (preparation and review)	Students will be required to complete homework tasks and/or preparation assignments/review tasks before class.
Method of Grade Evaluation	Final grades (A+ to F) will be awarded based on the following criteria: UT Component (max 80%) • Submission of a program completion certificate provided by the overseas university AND • Submission of a student progress report provided by the UT Austin (including attending at least 75% of the lessons in the English language course). Scores out of 80% will be determined by the evaluation of UT as a percentage. APU component (max 20%) Paragraph writing (8%) Reading response weekly assignment 6%) Reflection essay (6%) Students must also complete a pre- and post-test to receive a grade for this course. The APU grading system is as follows: A+ 90% or higher A 80 ~ 89 % B 70 ~ 79 % C 60 ~ 69 % F (Failure) 59 % or lower

Method of Implementing Multicultural Collaborative Learning	During this course, students will be exposed to the culture, society and lifestyle of people in the local region (in this case, Texas, USA). Furthermore, they will also be exposed to a wide variety of cultural perspectives by interacting with teachers and students in the English language course at the host university. They will need to use English to interact and collaborate with people from different cultures and backgrounds to complete a variety of tasks in this context.
Instructor's professional experience/involvement (outside academia)	
	APU Participation: Students are expected to participate actively in all class activities. This means: a) following the teacher's instructions; b) not sleeping in class; c) working actively with classmates; d) using English at all times; e) bringing appropriate materials to class. Attendance Students are expected to attend classes. Lateness to Class Students who are not present when attendance is taken will be officially recorded as absent. Absence from Class Students must attend at least 75% of classes (including lessons, tests and other examinations) to pass the course. Students who do not meet this attendance requirement will automatically receive a fail (F) grade. Absences will only be excused in the following cases: a. Contraction of an infectious disease (as recognized by Japanese School Health Law). Students must apply to the APU Academic Office with the required documentation in order to have their absences from English class excused for this reason. b. University-authorized leave of absence. In this case students must apply to the relevant APU office for a leave of absence. The office will then notify teachers directly. Responsibility of Absent Students Students who are absent from class must contact classmates or their teacher to find out about work done or assigned during their absence. Students who are absent from class must contact their teacher(s) as soon as possible to request a make-up. Plagiarism Students must not copy the work of others, in whole or in part, without use of academic citation. Instructors check student's work for plagiarism carefully, especially with reference to online sources. A student who plagiarizes will receive a mark of zero on the assignment and may possibly fail the course. Use of Al Students must strictly and carefully follow the CLE's policy on the use of Al when submitting all writing assignments and other related work. See Moodle course for more details.
	Students must follow test rules very carefully. If test rules are broken during a test, students will automatically receive a grade of zero for that test and may fail the entire course. 	up their language learning. Students should use English as much as possible outside of class
	time to complete daily tasks and learn about the local people and culture.
